
4ZZZ-FM: A History in Pictures

The photos are presented in roughly chronological order.





Returning from London in the early 1970s, Jim brought knowledge of the European developments in FM Stereo and alternative radio stations to the Brisbane push for independent media. He became a national player in the lobbying for community broadcasting. When the Whitlam Government decided to offer Australia's first community radio licenses in 1975, the 4ZZ team was ready, and immediately began construction of broadcast studios at St Lucia. 















































4ZZZ staff get Xmas sacking

Radio 4ZZZ, Queensland's pio-neer FM broadcaster, has sacked 10 of its 12 full-time staff.

The move 10 days ago — a day before the station's eighth birthday — came because

money had run out.
Yet 4ZZZ, which in 1975 became Brisbane's first new radio station in 30 years, continues to broadcast 24 hours a day

"It takes a bit more than no pay to get rid explains sacked announcer Tony Biggs, 24, who recently was put on the pay-roll after 18 months as a 4ZZZ volunteer. "I'd say everyone here will stick it through. In this state I think it's our duty."

Volunteers

The sacked 10 are under no obligation to stay, says the station's administrative co-or-dinator Liz Willis, 25, "but commitment is high and the retrenched staff are working normal shifts. They have no other sources of income.

Liz and finance co-ordinator Larry Ponting, 23, are 4ZZZ's more fortunate workers. They will continue to draw a net wage of \$122.95 a week. Last week Larry put in

80 hours. Sometimes it's more. Like most who join 4ZZZ full time, Liz and Larry began as volunteers. The station relies heavily on its 34 volunteers each of

whom work between four and 30 hours a

electronic medium in Queensland.

Staff regard 4ZZZ as the only alternative

"We won't take sponsorship (advertisements)," says Larry. "We offer an alternative. We can't have anything to do with

funding that might restrict us."
Radio 4ZZZ funds come largely from subscriptions and Rock 'n' Roll promotions.

Last year, says Larry, subscribers provided roughly 50 percent of the station's usable income of \$150,000. The employed subscribe at \$30 a year, tertiary students at \$25 and the jobless and school students at \$15.

Last year 10 percent of subscribers were unemployed. This year that percentage jumped to 41 because, says Larry, of subscriber benefits including entertainment and retail store discounts.

While this trend hurt 4ZZZ's bank balance, the station's reduced number of promotions, says Liz, really "lead to the crunch".

"We were able to organise only four Joint Efforts (Rock 'n' Roll gigs) this year, basically because we haven't had the bands to do any better," she says.

No-one at 4ZZZ expects money miracles next year, but plans to ease the pain include involvement in the Commonwealth Employment Program and completion of a

recording studio for lease on 4ZZZ premises.
"It would be great to be able to go out and promote ourselves," says Larry, "But we can't even afford to give our stickers away!"

"Obviously," says Liz, "we have to keep promoting local bands and get into other promotions such as films and disc jockeys. People aren't dancing to bands any more. It's all disco.'





































4ZZZ calls on CJC

SOUTH BRISBANE: Community radio station 4ZZZ will this week lodge a formal complaint with the Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) against police involved in riots at its annual Market Day music festival in Musgrave Park on Saturday.

A 4ZZZ spokesman, Jon Baird, yesterday described police action during the festival, at which police used riot gear and arrested more than 60 people, as "excessive" and "completely unjustified".

Mr Baird said officers ignored a conflict resolution agreement arranged between station staff and West End police and at no stage contacted organisers before mov-

ing in with riot gear.

He believed the speed at which riot gear was produced suggested it was a "ready part of a plan by police for use on the day".

"Overall, the spectacle of Queensland police using riot gear and officers on horseback in a densely-packed crowd situation, added to the muddy and wet conditions by a tropical storm, had all the ingredients of a potentially major tragedy for which Queensland police would have been deemed responsible," he said.

Police spokesman Brian Swift said fights broke out when police moved to quell the 5000-7000-strong crowd as it rushed to seek shelter from the rain. Officers were pelted with cans and other missiles, he said.

"When police began making arrests, the crowd rallied against police and continued to assault officers," Mr Swift said.

"An order was then given to police to disperse the crowd and put a stop to the disturbance. The crowd resisted these attempts and police reinforce-

ments were called."

As police investigations into the incident continued yesterday, Member for South Brisbane Anna Bligh called on police to exercise discretion and restraint at future public events.

"From discussions with 4ZZZ staff and senior police on Monday, it is clear that the

whole event could have been better handled," Ms Bligh said. Meanwhile, Federal Mem-

ber for Brisbane Arch Bevis has called for a Federal inquiry into the use of military police at the park.

"There are clear demarcation lines in the use of military police and attending rock concerts does not come into their jurisdiction," he said.

Minister Ian McLachlan yesterday said an Army investigation was under way and a

report would be made.














