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



January 5: We will start the month of January with more of the Encyclopaedia of Rock 'n' Roll. Tonight is the first of the "C" artists featuring "The Explosive Freddie Cannon" with golden oldies like "Talahasee Lassie" and "Palisade Park".

January 12: Here we have another Three-in-One Special with Johnny "I Walk the Line" Cash, The Champs (famous for "Tequila" and "El Rancho Rock" (and Chubby "The Twist" Checker. You can really shake your booty with this one.

January 19: More of the "C" artists with special segments on The Chiffons ("He's So Fine"), The Chordettes and Dee Clark. A must for all those "girlie group" lovers.

January 20: Don't miss this one. A Mammoth of Rock 'n' Roll. A back to back special on two giants of the fifties, Eddie Cochrane (remember "Summertime Blues", "20 Flight Rock", "C'mon Everybody" and countless others(and The Coasters (one of the all time great black groups who had such huge hits as "Searchin", "Charlie Brown", "Poison Ivy" and "Along Came Jones").

This programme is highly recommended - a true classic of Rock 'n' Roll.

NOTHIN BUT THE BLUES

Sunnyland Slim (Albert Laundrew) is a classic example of a bluesman. Born in Mississippi in 1907 he learned plano from the rough barelhouse planists at the age of 14. After three years he was good enough to be employed in a theatre, playing for silent movies.

In 1927 he moved to Memphis, his reputation increasing with the years. By 1942 he was living in Chicago and working with the musicians there. In 1947 he was the first bluesman to record for the Chess brothers' label, Aristocrat. He was backed by Muddy Waters.

Since then he has recorded steadily, mainly for small Chicago labels. The blues boom brought him trips to Europe and further recording activity. Even now, in his late 60's, he is still putting out excellent records.

It is not only for his own recordings that he is noted. The list of musicians he has played with reads like a Who's Who of blues. In Memphis he played with Ma Rainey, 'blind Blake and Blind Boy Fuller.

When he moved to Chicago he played with the musicians there - Tampa Red, Big Bill Broonzy and Sonny Boy Williamson No. 1. Then, in the 50's he played with the next generation of bluesmen Muddy Waters, Big Walter Horton, Johnny Shines and numerous others. Equally at home with a band or merely accompanying himself on piano, he is a living blues legend. - MICHAEL MAYER.



Jimi Hendrix and the Fender Stratocaster eventually became the perfect match. He owned immumerable Stratocasters (he often carried thirteen or more at a time).

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Randy Bachman has since gone on to purchase about three dozen instruments, and has tried to perfect the various devices with which he experimented earlier. For quite some time his main guitar has been the Fender Stratocaster.

During the musically bountiful years of the late Sixties, the Jeff Beck Group emerged Wood and Beck on guitars, Fender. Rounie was using a Stratocaster given to him by the "noble hands" of Eric Clapton.

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THE GREAT ROCK CONCERT IN THE SKY

WHERE ARE THEY NOW - THE GREAT BODGIES AND WIDGIES OF YESTERYEAR?

In the sparkling world of media stars, lousy pay, long hours and a weak FM signal, the staff of Triple Z come and go with a speed that bewilders the typesetters on the local dailies and even RADIO TIMES. Here's a general rundown on the comings and goings of recent times.

Ross Crighton - our original Programme Co-ordinator and record "beg borrow or stealer" until his pilgrimage to the US. He's already seen David Bromberg, Ry Cooder, Jimmy Buffett, John Hartford and Jackson Browne. His biggest dilemma for the New Year is whether to see The Tubes in 'Frisco or The Runaways and The Beachboys in L.A. Helen is one of the regular slaves at Triple Z Joint efforts etc and knocked up 300 meringues for the Anniversary Banquet. Needless, to say, the St Johns were keen supporters of devaluation as their savings diminished by almost one-fifth overnight.

Helen Hambling - is also off the airwaves being, at the time she left, the longest serving staff member at the station. Helen became interested when Triple Z was barely a gleam in Jim Beatson's eye, and went on to co-ordinate and participate in the two Test Transmissions in 1975, participated in the preparation of the licence submissions etc., worked as a brickies labourer during the construction period and became a full-time announcer for the first 12 months on air.

Ashleigh Merritt - leaves in early January for the U.S. having served as a frequent volunteer announcer, plus her pioneering of The Country Show. Ash says she'd rather see the States first because Europe's really only got Dr Feelgood, Graham Parker and the Greek islands.

Sue Horton - one of the original volunteer helpers, mainly in research and production, is enjoying a three month break in London, hoping for a White Xmas.

Brian Watson - while no longer on air is still lounging around True Blues at Toowong each day, a good spot to get your Triple Z T-Shirt.

Leo Sadlek - has returned to the States, as have most of our American exchange-teacher crowd of listeners and announcers (Greg Brown). Leo will return to Oz but perhaps to Victoria (no decent FM radio there yet, Leo).



Rob Cameron - Triple Z's own Jimmy Olsen is departing and will leave a big gap in the News staff, having developed into an extremely competent radio journalist, notwithstanding his inability to get through a gory news story without cracking a laugh.

Jim Beatson - founder and mascot of Triple Z has moved on to greener pastures, taking his invaluable organisational talents onto another needy group. As his 1976 Banana Award citation stated, "the only person who can convert the answer 'NO!' to 'YES, I'd love to do that for you!"

On the plus side, new arrivals to the sweat shop include: Bill Riner - joins the full-time staff as producer/announcer, presently taking David's place in the afternoon. Bill has had stacks of broadcasting experience, having worked for FM stations in the U.S. before coming to Oz. Recently, he has been doing programming and production work at 4KQ.



Julie Goodall - takes on the 2am-6am stretch on Sunday. Julie is half of the popular "Candy and Jodie" subscription plugs.

Leigh Bradshaw - does the other gravedigger shift. Among her other talents, Leigh has been serving as station photographer. Photocopies of her pics of

your favourite media star are available at \$20 each. She's made John Woods look handsome and charming (for instant smile, just add water, though he prefers something a little stronger). When Matchett isn't eating records, he appears in Leigh's shots as if suffering from over-exposure to the Bay City Rollers.

Bruno Kolberg - is another newcomer and produces a mean sub-plug and seems to have a sense of humour. A few 6 am starts on Saturdays should get the smile off his dial.

Early Request Show fanatics will be sorry to learn that the indescribably boring DWAYNE FLIQUE has got a job with the big time media in Sydney. We never did get to hear his serial about Mervyn the Hunchback Sheep. Uncle Dwayne was also responsible for the poorest taste subscription plug of the year - the Charles Manson/Sharon Tate ("say Hello, Sharon") number.



The A.B.C.B.'s LAST GASP

"By subletting a commercial broadcasting station licence, the licensee, without carrying out any of the responsibilities imposed by the licence, receives a regular profit therefrom. The right to operate a broadcasting station conferred by the licence is public property and it is wrong in principle that it should be used for purely personal profit. Broadcasting station licences by reason of their special character, clearly should not be permitted to become subject to practices such as subletting and trafficking which are quite unobjectionable in normal forms of commercial enterprise."

The above statement dated 26th June, 1950 is taken from a report to the Postmaster General by the Australian Broadcasting Control Board

A quarter of a century later the ABCB was requested by the then Minister for the Media, Moss Cass, to carry out a similar investigation into leasing out of radio station to groups or companies different in law and personality to those originally intended to hold the licence. The present minister for Post and Telecommunications, Eric Robinson, renewed the direction to the Board in March, 1976

In 1950 there were six radio stations operated by lesees, including one Sydney and two Melbourne stations. Twenty-six years later the same stations (2CH, 3KZ, 3XY) are still leased and another Sydney station (2KY) has joined them, despite the recommendation of the Board in 1950 that as a general policy, only in the most unusual circumstance should the Postmaster-General consent to any new agreement under which a licensee would permit another person to operate the station in question.

The unusual circumstances included licences held by political, cultural, religious and other like bodies, such category encompassing 2CH (owned by the New South Wales Council of Churches), 3KZ (Victorian ALP) and 3XY (Liberal Party). It is within this group that leased licencing has led to the greatest stagnation in radio.

Mark Armstrong, the principal witness at the Control Board's recent hearing, put arguments against divested broadcasting licences, which have been adopted by the Board in its recommendations to Mr Robinson. Mr Armstrong said he could see no reason why transfers of licences should be restricted where control of the licence remained in the same hands i.e. holding


company shuffling. However, in other circumstances, "...a public accountability process should apply before any approval is given."

In the words of the Control Board's report to the minister, Mark Armstrong "saw the least desirable kind of lease that by which the licensee derived some financial profit or gain by allowing another body to perform the obligations of the licensee. He considered that to allow money derived from operations conducted under a licence to be 'siphoned off' from the station operator was to reduce the potential of the station to provide a greater service to the public. He said that the most important single factor that the Minister should take into account in deciding whether to grant approval to a transfer... was the public interest."

Public inquiry proposals for commercial broadcasters are welcomed by public broadcasting stations like 4ZZZ. Public broadcasters believe that commercial stations should have to justify their programming and control before public hearings in the same way as public broadcasters are required to under recent amendments to the Broadcasting and Television Act. The recent recommendations also include a welcome guide for the new Broadcasting Tribunal as to the way public inquiries should be carried out.

The proposed procedures are aimed at saving time and money and the encouragement of independent witnesses. The report suggests that informal pre-hearing conferences be held to isolate points of difference or agreement; that there be an exchange of written arguments and replies before the hearing; applicants themselves to present their cases, with persons appearing before and inquiry entitled to be accompanies by legal counsel to give advice to the witness but such counsel not to present the case and finally that there be no cross examination.

It is hoped that the Tribunal which takes over many of the functions of the ABCB this month will follow laudable recommendations.

Rob Cameron has resigned as a journalist with 4ZZZ. Why?

My position with ZZZ as a full timer since we went to air December 8, 1975, in that magical vocation with the growing comical mystique "JOURNALIST", has had peculiarities all of their own.

Journalism is a sick trade and distorts outlooks.

After a while, you tend to examine events purely in an exploitative way, looking for sensational aspects, playing up the negative/destructive slants of an event. And in conversation with faceless people you find yourself not talking, but interrogating. And when newsy disasters occur (death en masse) your face lights up with hungry glee. And because you're absorbed in daily factfinding, you lose perspective and context, and you judgement becomes impaired.

It'S TOO EASY WHEN LIVING IN Brisbane to have just a narrow vision of anti-Bjelke Petersenism and think that'S ALL THERE IS, THE CENTRE OF THE WORLD.



Working with ZZZ is unlike and like other mass media conditions. Although ZZZ can carve out its own niche and introduce initiatives in broadcasting, we also have to feed and satisfy the minds of people nurtured on years of commercialism, that'S YOU AND ME, NONE OF US CAN ESCAPE THAT.

When you're sick and tired of spewing out news bulletin after news bulletin, interview after interview, cynicism grows. If parliamentary politics is dull, then it's a iournalist's job to present it as compelling, to titillate. And that means distortion, lies.

And a journalist looks for the articulate interviewee who can excite the listener. And genuine seeds of grass roots people's movements fall by the wayside because those people are you and me, not practised in the art of selling themselves and politicians are, and those who comprise the most important political movements gain the least air coverage.

Working at ZZZ day in, day out, you look for excuses to find the easy way out. Dishonest publicity seekers are always the easiest to contact, a phone call away.

Make no mistake, ZZZ is still at present the most vital development in the Australian media and yet it's not impossible seeing us go broke in the future. Why? Because we're honest in our money seeking. We ask you for a direct non-recurring grant. You listen to commercial media and the cost of advertising is imposed on you compulsorily via higher prices on Woolworths' shelves. But before 4ZZZ goes broke, people like me will break. ZZZ is a lifestyle, it gives much and also sucks blood. I need a rest, so do most of the staff. As a practical example of workers control, ZZZ is fascinating. Although cliques of power do coagulate at ZZZ, hopefully they're not irreconciliable.

At age 22 I've learnt more in the last 13 months than in any other time. ZZZnews/current affairs has succeeded and failed, the latter for two main reasons - lack of money, lack of audience profile. We've developed a credible news service, breaking many stories first, for what it's worth (latest being Henry Bland's resignation as ABC chairperson two days before anyone else in Australia). But at the same time many listeners have said they enjoy obvious send-ups, sarcasm and drunker laughter. See what I mean about audience profile?

Cedar Bay and East Timor and Fraser and Mental Health were the biggest topics in '76 in terms of our coverage The axing of In Depth was the most telling internadecision we've taken. Lest we forget, In Depth was not an access program, it's editorial control was more elites: than mainstream ZZZ programming, and its content appealed to a smaller group of people than it did in its timeslot. It grew out of the roots of academia and suffered as a result.

The ZZZ newsroom wants to demystify death, wants to fuel radical groundswells, wants to force other media to open their eyes, wants to make listeners WANT to hear a black tribal elder cry over a destroyed heritage, wants to defeat the political censorship that exists under our

But the ZZZ newsroom will probably do none of these things. That's not why I'm leaving. - ROB CAMERON








ON THE RECEIVING END

This article covers the creating and transmitting of the F.M. (Frequency Medulating) signal and it is here that the real difference between 4ZZZ and all other A.M. stations lies.

When the left and right signals from the studio via the centrel room arrive at the multiplexer (which lives with the transmitter), they are processed te give two different signals, one being the sum of the left and right (L+R) channels, the second being the difference (L - R) between the two channels.

The L+R directly frequency modulates what is called the main carrier, which has a frequency of 105.7 Megahertz (MHz). It is this signal that portable "mono" recievers pick up, enabling them to produce beth the left and right channels together. The L-R signal modulates a sub-carrier of 38 Kilohertz (KHz), to produce what is called a double side-band suppressed carrier signal. This sub-carrier then frequency modulates the main carrier. There is also another signal of 19 KHz (in phase with the 38 KHz sub-carrier) which frequency modulates the main carrier.

The modulating of the main carrier is carried out in the first stage of the transmitter, after which it is amplified by the second stage to a power of 10 Watts. The first two stages are transistorised but the final stage has two valves (2 × 4C × 250BS). The final stage has a power output of 450 - 500 Watts which is then fed to the antennae. This antennae has a "gain"



of two, thus giving an effective radiated power (E.R.P.) of 1000 Watts, approximately. This "gain" is the result of "focusing" the transmitted signal, redirecting otherwise wasted power to the listeners. The set-up on Mt. Coot-tha will be similar except a higher power transmitter together with a higher "gain" antennae will be used, thus giving an E.R.P. of 10,000 Watts.

If all this hasn't bored you too much, there will be more in the next issue covering the stereo receiver.
